Plum Pulling

BY ULFAR INN SVARTI PORISSON Growing up, one of my favorite things about the holiday season was the preparing and eating the special meals that we only got to enjoy once a year. For my family this meant Turkey with stuffing on Thanksgiving, latkes with applesauce on the first day of Hanukkah, and roast beef with Yorkshire pudding, or a ham on Christmas.

Of course these amazing feasts need the company of tasty desserts to finish them off. It took almost until I was an adult to realize that, of all the traditional foods, most other families did not share a plum pudding at Christmas. According to the most easily accessed website, the English pudding originated in the 14th century and evolved from a mixture of meats with fruits and spices to the fruity bread pudding of late. Small trinkets with specific meanings are wrapped and hidden within. It is always exciting to find your fortune for the next (Having a mother and aunt who constantly tried to meddle with the results was half the fun, when my cousins and I were kids) Anyway, our own recipe was passed to my great grandmother by her relative, and so has been in the family since the middle to late 1800s.

McMicking Plum Pudding

Mix together:

3 Tbsp. minute tapioca soaked in 1 C milk

1 C. fresh bread crumbs (2 slices)

1/2 C. raisins

1/2 C. currants

1/2 C. candied orange peel, or candied fruits, now that the former is hard to find

1 Tbsp. melted butter

1/3 C. sugar

1 Tbsp. baking soda dissolved in 1/4 C. warm milk

Put the mixture into a buttered mold and steam for 2 1/2 hours

Foamy Sweet Sauce

Beat one egg yolk with 2/3 C. powdered sugar.

Add:

1 beaten egg white

1/2 C. cream, whipped

1 tsp. vanilla



A level 1 Scribal Tutorial


Brother Thomas the Green Brother Thomas is a scribe of the Midrealm, who produces The Verdant Quill, a regular newsletter on the monastic arts - scribe work, bookbinding and more. This article has been reprinted by gracious permission.

Step 1: Masking Edge. The masking edge is a one-inch border that you draw around your scroll. All designs should be placed inside this border so as to create an "artfree" zone that people can hold / handle the finished piece.




Step 2: Using your ruler, draw a series of


lines that are a quarterinch Inside of your masking edge. These lines should be lightly drawn so that they can be more easily erased later.



Step 3: Using your ruler, draw another series of lines that are a full inch Inside of the lines you just drew in step 2. These lines should be lightly drawn so that they can be more easily erased later.




Step 4: Using your ruler, draw boxes in the corners of the scroll. These boxes are one and a half inches on each side.




Then take your eraser and erase the masking edge lines on either side and at the top and bottom of the scroll so that you create the

four boxes in the corners.

Step 5: When you're done with adding the new boxes and erasing the outer and inner lines you'll have created the basic structure of the "Box and Bar" design.




Step 6: Now that you have the basic shape on the page, your next step is to create Frames within the Bars.


Draw lines that are a quarter-inch inside the bars from both sides.


Step 7: Divide the space within the Frames into inch(ish) wide sections to break up the big spaces into smaller spaces that can be filled with a variety of designs.



Corner Designs


Designs for the corner boxes are often filled with simple, geometric shapes such as diamonds or circles. To match the symmetry of the quarter-inch frames of the corner boxes, the diamond and circle are also kept at a quarter-inch as well.





Bar Details


One option for adding detail to the Bars is to divide them in half with a center line. This creates smaller sections that can be colored alternately.



Bar Designs


You can fill the bars with any number of geometric designs. This is where you, as an artist or doodler, can let yourself explore whatever pattern that you would like.

Shown here, the designs are typically based on geometric shapes for ease of construction.



Painting

How you decide to paint a scroll's design is often a matter of choice. You can use one color, two or even three if the design can support the complexity of colors.



Finishing


Finishing the scroll's design may include Whitework, Gilding, Blackwork, Rubrication in a series of dots, lines or designs that complement the pattern.

Whitework: Accenting dots, designs or lines in white

Gilding: Using gold paint or leaf.

Blackwork: Accenting dots, designs or lines in black

Rubrication: Accenting dots, designs or lines in red.
